Our Goal: To provide students a tool to guide their academic career at Simpson College and help them to utilize academic advising to its fullest extent.

Our Mission: Academic advising at Simpson College is a collaborative process between the student and the advisor. The academic advisor works with other college faculty and staff to guide and encourage the student to take responsibility for successfully completing an academic program and preparing for the future in accordance with the college mission statement.

Objectives:

- 1. To help each student prepare and complete an academic program that is consistent with their desires, passions, skills, and strengths.
- 2. To serve as a resource for information about the college and its programs and to appropriately refer students to other college professionals.
- 3. To encourage appreciation for and understanding of liberal arts education.

In the first-year, students will have a Liberal Arts Advisor assigned as part of the SC101 or SC201 experience. When students declare a major, they will select a Major Advisor in their major area. Students may also have one or more Supplemental Advisors, for example an advisor in Student Support Services (SSS), or an advisor in their minor.

Student Learning Outcomes:

As a result of the academic advising process at Simpson College, students will be able to:

- Utilize the resources and services on campus to evaluate personal interests and abilities leading to the creation of realistic academic, personal, and professional goals
- Understand and access information about academic policies, academic deadlines, and graduation requirements through the College's online resources
- Develop an educational plan that leads to the timely completion of their educational goals
- Develop the critical thinking and independent decision-making skills to make and accept responsibility for academic decisions
- Discover and integrate co- and extra-curricular activities and programs that enhance the collegiate experience
- Fulfill responsibilities as educated citizens of Simpson College and of a democratic, diverse, and global society

Fall Semester

Prior to the Start of the Year:

- ♦ Get to know the academic system (Scholar and Simpson Connect)
- ♦ Review your detailed schedule
- ♦ Purchas textbooks and school supplies
- ♦ Consider contacting your academic advisor
- ♦ Review course descriptions in the course catalog

September:

- ♦ Develop a 4-year academic plan
- ♦ Explore study abroad opportunities
- ♦ Familiarize yourself with Scholar and Simpson Connect
- ♦ Get to know your Simpson Colloquium (SC) Advisor
- ♦ Make an appointment to meet your advisor one-on-one and discuss academic and career goals
- ♦ Connect with academic resources, i.e. Writing Center, Hawley, Student Support Services, Career Center
- ♦ Attend the Organization Fair

October:

- ♦ Review your midterm grades. Do you need to get a tutor or go to the writing center?
- ♦ Meet with your professors to discuss your current course progress
- Meet with your advisor about registration for Spring semester; be sure to go prepared to discuss your current grades, interests, and classes you would like to take in the Spring
- ♦ Make sure your advisor checks you off for Spring registration
- ♦ Make sure you have no holds on your account that would prohibit your from registering for classes
- ♦ Attend the Majors/Minors fair

November:

- ♦ Register for Spring classes
- ♦ Prepare for final exams and papers

December:

♦ Continue preparation for final exams and determine when your final exams will take place and your final papers are due

Spring Semester

January:

- ♦ Review your detailed schedule
- ♦ Check your final Fall grades for accuracy and consider how to improve your grades in Spring (if needed)
- ♦ Add/drop courses if necessary to fine tune your schedule (be sure to check the add/drop date and make sure all adjustments are submitted in time)
- ♦ Plan how to incorporate activities within your course schedule

February:

- ♦ Attend activities you signed up for
- ♦ Check out the Study Abroad fair
- ♦ Meet with your advisor to update them on any changes
- ♦ Connect with academic resources, if needed

March:

- ♦ Review your midterm grades and seek assistance if necessary
- ♦ Meet with your professors to discuss your current course progress
- ♦ Review your degree audit and discuss your engaged citizenship curriculum and major/minor program with your advisor.
- ♦ Meet with your advisor about registration for Summer and Fall semesters; be sure to go prepared to discuss your current grades, interests, and classes you would like to take in the Summer and/or Fall
- ♦ Make sure your advisor checks you off for Fall registration
- ♦ Make sure you have no holds on your account that would prohibit your from registering for classes
- ♦ Register for Summer and Fall courses

April:

- ♦ Discuss your interests and possible major/minor with your advisor
- ♦ Prepare for final exams and papers and determine when they will take place or are due

Advising Responsibilities for Students

- ♦ Schedule time to meet with your Liberal Arts or Major Advisor before class registration
- ♦ Request and advisor in your major, once you have declared a major
- ♦ Inform the Registrar's Office of changes in your academic program
- ♦ Meet graduation requirements
- ♦ Come prepared to advising appointments (bring your four-year plan, your embedded curriculum worksheet, a list of courses you're interested in taking the following semester, any changes you need to discuss with your advisor, and a list of questions you need answered)
- ♦ Gather all relevant decision-making information before your meeting
- ♦ Clarify and/or revise your personal goals
- ♦ Complete all of the "to do's" recommended by your advisor at your last meeting or via email
- ♦ Ask questions if you do not understand an issue or have a specific concern
- ♦ Take responsibility for exploring career options
- ♦ Seek opportunities (organizations, activities, internships, jobs, study abroad opportunities) that are consistent with your areas of interest
- ♦ Review your degree audit and graduation requirements frequently

Advising Responsibilities for Advisors

- ♦ Provide academic counsel, personal guidance, and professional guidance for students
- ♦ Maintain professional relations with students
- ♦ Be accessible and responsive to advisees
- ♦ Communicate college policies and procedures
- ♦ Help students define and develop realistic goals (short and long term)
- ♦ Match students' needs with available resources and make appropriate referrals
- ♦ Assist students' with planning programs consistent with abilities and interests
- ♦ Educate advisee about the major and/or career field
- ♦ Monitor and support students' progress



Four-Year Advising Checklist

Year 1:

- ♦ Learn what campus clubs and activities are right for you
- ♦ Visit fairs on campus to learn about your interest socially and academically
- ♦ Think about if going abroad is right for you
- ♦ Learn about major requirements
- ♦ Familiarize yourself with Simpson's online systems and degree audit
- ♦ Develop a four-year plan of study with your advisor
- ♦ Meet with your advisor each semester
- ♦ Attend lectures on campus related to career, major, and personal interests

Year 2:

- ♦ Discuss internship possibilities with the Office of Civic Engagement
- ♦ Continue to attend campus information sessions and career events
- ♦ Shadow career professionals in fields you are considering
- ♦ Declare a major, if you haven't done so already
- ♦ If you plan to study abroad, plan which semester that would work best with your advisor
- ♦ Review/adjust your four-year plan
- ♦ Continue involvement in extracurricular activities
- ♦ Attend lectures on campus related to career, major, and personal interests
- ♦ Visit career services and explore your interest further
- ♦ Begin to develop a resume and have it review by career services

Year 3:

- ♦ Take graduate/professional school exams as required
- ♦ Discuss career and graduate school opportunities
- ♦ Review/adjust your four-year plan
- ♦ Attend lectures on campus related to career, major, and personal interests
- ♦ Update your resume
- ♦ Check your degree audit for accuracy and apply for graduation

Year 4:

- ♦ Apply to graduate/professional schools and/or jobs
- ♦ Attend lectures on campus related to career, major, and personal interests
- ♦ Develop a career search strategy and meet with Career Services to implement
- ♦ Attend job fairs on and off campus
- ♦ Attend mock interview sessions or set up mock interviews for yourself
